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## Report of the Trustees For The Year Ended 30 June 2020

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The aims of the Society are, throughout the world, but with a special emphasis on the British Isles:

- To promote and advance the teaching and study of lichens.
- To encourage and actively support the conservation of lichens and their habitats.
- To raise public awareness of the beauty of lichens and of their importance as indicators of the health of our environment.

## Significant activities

- 1. The Society publishes two periodicals: The Lichenologist is published six times a year and is a highly respected international scientific journal while the Bulletin is published twice a year with accounts of Society activities, lichen records and information for members.
- 2. The Society organises three field meetings a year and usually at least one specialist workshop for members.
- 3. The Society maintains two databases of lichen records, the Lichen Mapping Scheme which holds distribution data, and a Recorder database which holds the details of each record. National agencies and others have a requirement for this information which the Society is in a unique position to provide.
- 4. The Society offers awards and grants to members to support the study of lichens and lichenology including attendance at field meetings, courses and workshops for students and other workers with limited financial means, principally via the Wallace-Burnet-Gilbert Fund. The Society also provides summer vacation scholarships, overseas members' travel awards and grants for small ecological projects. Grants from the Tom Chester Bequest are offered to schools or colleges involving students in lichen projects.
- 5. The Society provides partnership funding for projects that are in line with the Society's objectives.
- 6. The Society maintains a library from which members may borrow publications and a herbarium from which specimens may be borrowed.
- 7. The Society works closely through its committees and members with other relevant organisations and funding bodies, for example the Field Studies Council, Plantlife, Natural England, Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH), Natural Resources Wales, the Royal Society of Biology and the Linnean Society.

#### Public benefit

The trustees consider they have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission.

## Charitable purposes

Of the 12 specific purposes listed in the Charities Act 2011, the Society's work is covered by the following:

- The advancement of the arts, culture, heritage or science.
- The advancement of environmental protection or improvement.
- The advancement of education.

## **Key Strategies**

- To publish work relating to lichens in the Society's own and other publications.
- To facilitate the exchange of information among lichenologists by means of field meetings, workshops, conferences, lectures, exhibitions and other means.
- To promote education and awareness of lichens and to support the training of lichenologists.
- To assist in the maintenance of adequate collections of British lichens in public herbaria.
- To develop and maintain databases of information on lichens in Britain.
- To maintain a library of books and lichenological journals.
- To promote the views of the Society on matters relating to lichens at local and national levels. The above information is expounded more fully in the Constitution (2015).

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

- 1. The Lichenologist volume 51 (2019) was published according to plan with six parts totalling 585 pages. Two issues of the Bulletin were also produced.
- 2. The BLS database continues to grow, and now contains more than 1.65 million lichen records for England, Scotland and Wales. The funded project has been completed so the database is now being maintained by volunteers. All the records are publicly accessible through the NBN Atlas.
- 3. Field meetings and workshops open to anyone interested in lichens were held at Holy Island, Anglesey, N. Wales, in July 2019, Rydal Park, Cumbria (recording meeting), in September 2019, Dorking, Surrey, in October-November 2019, and Arniston House, nr. Gorebridge, Midlothian, on 2 February 2020 (post-AGM meeting). A workshop was held at Cloughton, Scarborough, in March 2020. Meetings planned for the rest of 2020 were cancelled because of the Covid-19 pandemic.
- 4. The Society gave two grants totalling £818, both from the Wallace-Burnet-Gilbert Fund to allow members to attend field meetings.
- 5. The Society initiated a project to digitise and make available to members 'Grey Literature', that is unpublished reports and surveys of lichens.
- 6. International collaboration at a professional level continues to flourish and is diverse. More generally, international members from time to time attend meetings held in the UK.
- 7. The Lobarion survey, a major project to assess the status of rare species in lichen sites that have not been visited for some time, has been completed. The Society is also supporting a study of the endangered River Jelly Lichen in Scotland.

### **Fundraising Statement**

The British Lichen Society does not actively raise funds from the public and does not employ fund raising agencies, street fund raisers or undertake telephone fund raising programs. The charity does receive ad-hoc donations and legacies from the general public.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

## Financial position

The income from charitable activities for the year was £158,812 (2019: £161,204).

Net income for the year, after charitable activities and costs associated with fund raising was £53,315 (2019: £28,325).

At the end of the financial year reserves were £627,872 (2019: £574,557) with £8,116 (2019: £8,116) being restricted funds.

Profit from the Proprietor share of The Lichenologist (vol. 51 for 2019 was £69,883 (2019: £66,580), £19,456 (2019: £19,156) being contributed by the British Lichen Society. It should be noted that this total income includes £2,293 (2019: £4,095) from sales of digitalised journal content.

## Principal funding sources

The principal sources of funding year on year are Members' subscriptions and the Proprietor's share of The Lichenologist publication.

## **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

## Reserves policy

It is the policy of the Society to maintain sufficient unrestricted reserves for the Society to be in a position to absorb setbacks and take advantage of change and opportunities and to meet its project obligations. The Society has sufficient unrestricted reserves to continue to cover four years of total expenditure should sources of income dramatically decrease.

This was considered necessary to build up as the Society is heavily reliant upon The Lichenologist publications and should this cease, this would have a significant impact upon the Society. The Society also felt it prudent to hold reserves to cover future costs from potential requirement to outsource some functions and operations and also budgetary pressures from our current Museum and Botanical Garden partners may result in the need for future charges for storage of our extensive libraries and herbarium which are currently kindly provided for free.

A loss of income was anticipated and potential further cost implications were expected to follow as a result of the introduction within the last couple of years of open access, requiring the unrestricted access of published findings of academic research available electronically without charge. To date this has not had a significant impact on the Society, but is monitored for uptake levels.

The reserve policy shall be subject to review by the council over the coming year.

#### Impact of Covid-19

The core aims and objectives of the Society, being long term, are not affected by the Covid-19 pandemic but, as might be expected, all planned activities from the start of it have been disrupted.

Since February 2020, all field meetings have been cancelled or postponed as these involve members from around the country meeting in a context where social distancing is impractical. Local groups have also been discouraged from holding field meetings.

The Council meeting planned for Leeds in May 2020 was instead held on 'Zoom'. Attendance was 100% and there was a considerable saving in Council expenses. Membership services operated by the Royal Society of Biology have been hardly affected despite most RSB staff working from home. The Society's publications were produced with minimal disruption. Looking to the future twelve months, steps are being taken to allow for the fact that precautionary measures may need to be taken for some considerable time and to reduce risks of infection. No dates have yet been set for field meetings in 2021 and risk assessments for such meetings will now include Covid precautionary measures in line with government guidelines. Council meetings will continue to be virtual until assessments conclude that it is safe to meet in person. Lastly, the AGM scheduled for February 2021 will be online only.

## **FUTURE PLANS**

- The Society will continue to support the study and conservation of lichens by means of publications, grants, field meetings and courses.
- A small team of members will continue to co-ordinate and work upon a third version of 'The Lichens of Great Britain & Ireland'.
- 3. The Society is working towards becoming a Charitable Incorporated Organisation which it hopes to achieve during the coming Financial Year.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

The Society's governing document is the Constitution, most recent revision January 2015.

## Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are elected at the Society's AGM. The President and Vice-President each serve a term of two years. Other Officers serve a term of one year. Council members serve a term of three years.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## Organisational structure

The Society is managed by its Council, who are Trustees for the purpose of the Charities Act 2011, which meets three times a year and is chaired by the President.

The officers of the Society are the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Assistant Treasurer & Membership Secretary, the Senior Editor, the Chairs of the Conservation Committee, Data Committee, Education & Promotions Committee and Members' Services Committee and the Bulletin Editor.

The committees report to each Council meeting. The following report in person to the Council meeting prior to the AGM and at other times through the appropriate Chair: Field Meetings Secretary, Mapping Recorder, Database Manager, Archivist, Curator, Librarian and Webmaster.

Decisions pertaining to charitable status are discussed at Council and voted upon if necessary. Major decisions that involve the whole membership are discussed and voted upon at the AGM.

## Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are provided with the Charity Commission's publication "The Essential Trustee" and asked to read it to understand their responsibilities and obligations under charity law. As members of the Society they will possess a copy of the Constitution and the latest Trustees' Annual Report. The function and organisation of Council is also explained in a document 'Roles and Responsibilities'.

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Council annually considers risks to which the Society might be exposed. The Society has Public Liability Insurance and Trustee Liability Insurance to mitigate the risks to which it is exposed.

#### Relationships with other bodies

- The Society is a member of the Royal Society of Biology and is represented at appropriate meetings of this organisation.
- The Society is an Associate Member of the National Biodiversity Network Trust.

The Council have had due regard to principals of recommended practices as set out by the 'Charity Governance Code' and have applied these wherever practicable and in decision making.

## Notes to the Financial Statements For The Year Ended 30 June 2020

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charities' ability to continue as a going concern.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Unrestricted Income is used towards meeting any of the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted Income is allocated against resources for a specific purpose.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants payable are payments made to third parties in furtherance of the charitable objects.

There are currently five grants available to members; Summer Vacation Scholarship, Overseas Members Travel Fund, Wallace-Burnet-Gilbert Fund, Tom Chester Award and Small Ecological Project Grant.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities comprise all costs incurred in the pursuit of the charitable objects of the charity. Support costs, where not wholly attributable, are apportioned between the categories of charitable expenditure in addition to the direct costs.

## Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on reducing balance

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

## **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds within the unrestricted funds category are amounts set aside for a particular purpose by the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

## Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.
